McKinley and Roosevelt the People's Choice!

16 to 1 Again Rejected!

Imperialism not Feared by Americans!

Republican County Men Elected!

As we expected, the Republican nominees on the National ticket have been elected by the people. It will not be certainly known for a few days just how many electoral votes they will have, but as we write the indications are for from 292 to 300. There are 447 members in the Electoral College, making 224 votes necessary to elect.

In 1896, Mr. McKinley received 271; Mr. Bryan 173. New Jersey gave over 52,000 plurality, and will have an

increased majority in the Legislature.

Congressman Gardner was re-elected; his estimated pluralities in the four counties being nearly 12,000.

ELECTION DAY.

It was the finest day of the season.

To-day, the papers stated that for the

first time in history not a drop of rain

fell in the United States on that day,

and only in a small area in the middle

western States did they have cloudy

weather. The temperature was mild

for the season, and it seemed as though

every voter was out.

Not so, however. In Hammoncton

we have on the registers exactly 700

men; the total vote polled was 575,

leaving 125 who could not or would not

vote. Wonder why? The Democrats

lost some votes in this way, and the

Republicans lost more. In 1896 we

polled 619.

There was much good humored ex-

citement during the day, and the towns

appeared lively. A few votes were

challenged, but we believe all were

allowed to vote.

The vote was counted and announced

before ten o'clock, and created no sur-

prise.

The telephones were listened to by

many, until, finding no satisfaction in

the meagre returns, the number was

gradually reduced. At party head-

quarters, however, the crowd remained

until well on into the night, and the

Republicans set up a hot coffee

crackers and cheese to abundance, to all

comers, in their club room, and request

messages came from all parts of the

country. At midnight the election of

Mr. McKinley was conceded. After

two o'clock in the morning the boys

paraded, with flags, horns, megaphones,

tin pans, and anything to make a noise,

with rockets and Roman candles, and

bonfires for accompaniment. Perhaps

there wasn't a racket about town.

About 3:30 the special train brought

papers from the city, which confirmed

the bulletins received here, and gave

renewed zest to the jubilation.

AN ORDINANCE to allow a rebate of taxes to all persons owning and using wagons with tires four inches or wider in width.
Introduced Sept. 20, 1900.
Passed October 6, 1900.

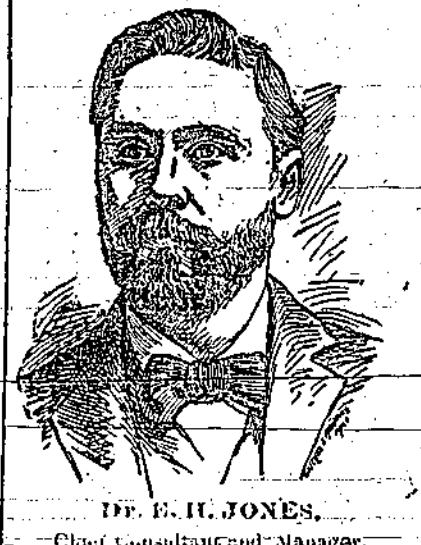
