Help a Worthy Cause.

Next Wednesday evening, at Palace Theatre, Hammonton people will be told all about the camp life of our boys, in this country and in France, by representatives of the Y. M. C. A. War Council. Pictures will be thrown on the screen, of camp life; and speakers from various parts of the State will tell of the dangers surrounding the boys, of the business parasites, of the drink evil, and the great need of Y. M. C. A. work among them. They will tell that a fund of \$35,000,000 is being raised—New Jersey's share being \$1,750,000,—with which to carry out their big brother idea, keeping the boys away from houses of ill repute.

All are urged to attend, the women and children having a special invitation. Hammonton Band, Home Guards, Red Cross, Boy Scouts, and all organizations, American and Italian, will march through town, forming on the school grounds at 7.15.

This County is well organized. A local committee of twenty-four has been appointed, who have held several meetings, and are to make a canvass of the townspeople.

Those who missed the public meeting Wednesday night missed one of the most stirring ever held here. L. W. Statler, County Secretary, spoke, as did also Rev. Robert A. Rilewood (whom Uncle Sam sends to give the last hand-shake at the wharves), and Rev. J. Snyder Carlisle, who has charge of Hut No. 8, at Camp Dix,—all creating a determination to help in the work.
