A N-ORDINANCE—to allow a rebate of taxes to all persons owning and using wagons with tires four inches or wider in width.

Introduced Sept. 20, 1900. Passed October 6, 1900.

Be it ordained by the Council of the Town of Hammonton—

Sec. 1. That all persons residing in the Town of Hammonton owning and using wagons with tires four inches or broader in width shall be allowed a rebate of one dollar per wheel per annum for each wheel used on said wagons, from the taxes levied and assessed against the owners and users thereof.

Sec. 2. That the Collector of the Town of Hammonton is hereby authorized to allow the said rebate upon proof, satisfactory to him, of the ownership and use of such wagons.

Sec. 3. That this ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its passage.
