DUTCH UNION PIE.  
Fry seven sliced onions in butter until light brown. Add one-half cup of sugar and one-half cup of raisins. Simmer for ten minutes. Add one cup of milk and one cup of flour. Bake in a hot oven for one hour.

BUTTERNUT BREAD.  
Some sweeten this and some spice it. Personally I prefer it sweetened. It is all a matter of taste, however. One cup of butternut milk, one cup of sugar, one cup of flour, and one cup of butter. Bake in a hot oven for one hour.

HOMEMADE IRISH COFFEE.  
Put in a dripping pan a layer of clean wheat bran, pour over this two or three cups of molasses, mix well, then brown in an oven, stirring often to brown evenly. 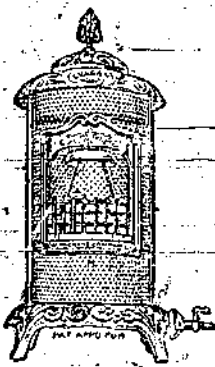




## Chilly Mornings Cool Nights

## AN ORDINANCE Fixing the Salary of the Town Clerk.

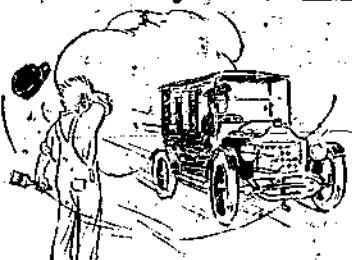
## Mr. King's Book.
