ANDMARK ON THE HUDSON

Lord Cornwalits Once Stept. One of the landmarks on the Hildon River is an old house at the foot of the Palisades, just south of Alpine Landing. It was built more than one hundred and fifty years ago as an Indian trading station. Subsequentnarrow path was out leading to the summit of the Palisades. The locality was known as Closter Landing until about twenty-five years ago, when it was changed to Alpine.

- Not much is known concerning the old house previous to the Revolutionary war. Then an event in vested it with historic interest.
