Fire, Water and Light Committee reported electric lighting unsatisfactory during the month. Numerous cases of unlighted street lamps, also, many poles down. Repairs made as promptly as possible. One fire alarm during month; slight damage.

License Committee reported back to Council the application of B. Foglietta for liquor license. Cannot recommend that it be granted, because of general protest of property owners in that vicinity. Reported favorably on application of N. F. Bowker for renewal of license.

Overseer of the Poor reported serving the legal papers on Bacheria, and that Judge Endicott would hear the case on Tuesday, 27th inst.

B. Foglietta's license application was withdrawn. Bowker's was renewed for one year,—his bond, signed by Samuel Anderson and Jos. S. Mart, being accepted.

Property Committee reported that Mr. H. S. Haines had completed the town map and tracings, and that the same had been placed in the vault of the People's Bank,—it being too large for the town safe.

Law and Order Committee reported that owing to frequent complaints, the Marshal has been instructed to enforce the bicycle lamp ordinance, and has made several arrests in consequence.

Ordinances introduced, authorizing Attorney Chandler to apply to the Court of Chancery for an order compelling the Railroad Companies to erect

safety gates, as per ordinance passed in May, 1899. Passed first reading and laid over.

H. M. Phillips, acting Fire Chief, reported the hose now in use worthless, nearly all leaking badly. Part of this is eleven years old; the balance, seven years.

Council decided to attend next fire drill, to inspect apparatus.

Adjourned.
