### Second Crop Seed Potatoes.

EDITOR REPUBLICAN :- I have been dabbling in a new industry the past summer, -that of trying to raise second crop pointoes for seed. Although have not made a financial success, have gained some experience which may serve me in the future, and be of some use to some of your readers.

I had been hearing and reading for some time about the superiority of second crop seed over first crop northern grown seed. It was claimed that such seed would lose none of its vitality by eprouting before plant-time, that the crop would be earlier, that quite small seed could be used with success. Always ready to try new things, I ordered a barrel of an early variety grown in New Jersey, and two new varieties from

Maryland. As these were high priced, and as there was some discount on the smaller size. I took one barrel of Boves half of it the small size. The other variety was Vick'e Early Pride. planted on a good clover and, the 6th and 7th of April, and used a good article of fertilizer, 900 pounds to the acre. This may seem a large dose to some, but would be esteemed a homeopathic dose to Long Island and Norfolk, Virginia, farmera, who use a ton to the acre for the early crop. Not a sprout of size to be broken off was seen, while a barrel of northern grown Early Rose chipped to a neighbor, from Philadelpris, and planted at the same time, had lots of sprouts two inches long, which would be broken off in the handling. I ran a weeder over them at least every week from the time they were planted until they were six inches high; by which time they had but little unsprouted weed seed among thom, and I had no use for a hoe, but went over them occasionally and pulled out here and there a large weed. After that, ran a scratch barrow over them once a week till they covered the space between the tows so I could go no longer. About this time the severe June drought, which burned up our strawberries, began to check their growth, and they came to a stand-still, apparently. Later on, a good rain came. I dug my first, for tablewso. July 5th. Had good sized





"For many scientific reasons we have come to the conclusion that the truly maintal fever is caused solely by the mosquito-probably entirely by the anopheles species. We estimate, then, that most of the malarial fever can be

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
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
