The Cuban wreckers, who have been working round the abandoned wrecks of Admiral Cervera's fleet off Santiago, found the safe of the Almirante Oquendo, and found in it \$100,000 in Spanish gold, which was intended as pay for the Spanish soldiers. About \$120,000 worth of copper and brass has also been removed from the wrecks. The popular local opinion is that the United States made a mistake in not making a more determined effort to raise these wrecks. The building of textile mills in the South is keeping step with the development of her iron and steel industries, and converting her from an exclusively agricultural to a mixed agricultural and manufacturing section. The South is too well adapted for agriculture for this; it is well adapted for the "back ground," as it has been in the sterile hills of New England, but there is no reason why manufacturing should not be equally developed. When that is done the South will be the richest part of the nation.

If you want to enter sunshine around your path, and can't go stumping, and don't want to be a missionary, adopt the simple rule of paying your debts cheerfully and promptly. It lubricates the wheels of trade, breaks up party ice, gives tone to the social system and liberates good will. Pay as you go. The town of Pelzer, S. C., is one of the most remarkable places in the United States. According to Major Chas Smythe, the author, who went to Pelzer on a lecturing tour, the town is one of 7,000 inhabitants and every foot of land is owned and controlled by a Southern cotton mill corporation. With all its large population the town has no policeman. There is no mayor, no city council, or aldermanic board, and no organized government of any sort. Lawyers are not permitted to live within the town's limits. There is not a colored person in the town, though some few reside on the outskirts. Capt. Smythe is the moving spirit of the enterprise. He is the head of the mill corporation, and his word is law in the town. He is known personally by the 7,000 inhabitants, and they love him as if he were their father. There are no saloons or cigarettes, only a few doctors and one photographer.
