





Only 16,966,446 of the coins has been retired and melted for recoinage into cents up to. July last,

When the coinage of the 2-cent piece was discontinued in 1873 there was no particular mission for it as there is now. An extra dent had to be added to buy a letter postage stamp. The 2-cent newspaper had hardly arrived. The 3-cent piece was the handy coin, fitted for these dally noidental purchases of the people. This is indicated by the fact that the coinage of nickel 3-cent pieces was continued until 1890. By that time the price standard had changed. Two-cont lotter postage was in vogue; newapa, pers had been reduced to the 2-cent rate.
