N ORDINANCE to regulate the use of Bicycles, Tricycles, and similar

vabiolos. <u>Introduced Sept. 25, 1397.</u> Passed Nov. 27, 1597. Section 1. Be it ordshued by the Town of Remannizor, in Courcel essenabled, that all bioyeles, tri-yoles, and similar vabiles, when in u-son the public highways, streets, equares. parks and public places within the limits of the Town of Hommonton, between one hour alter sunset and sunrise, are required to have a lamp of such illuminating power as to be plainly seen one bundred yards abend, attached there-to, and kept lighted.

Sec. 2. And be it ordained, that all such Sec. 2. And be it ordained, that all such bioycles, truey-les, and similar vehicles as are described in section one of this ordinance are required to carry a suitable slarm bell, which when rung may be heard one hundred fast distant.
