The ladies have taken this space for one year, and are responsible for all that it may contain.

The probibition law still prevails in Kansas, but its enforcement is a matter of local option. Towns are "wet" or 'dry" according to the demands of public sentiment as to the closing of the saloons. In large cities, generally speaking, there are broweries and distilleries, and the drinking places are open night and day, as in states that have no prohibitory law. There are, however, exceptions. Very little liquor is publicly sold in Topeka, for example; and in Lawrence, Leavenworth, and a large majority of the second-class cities and towns none is sold except on the sly.

Prohibition is not a dead letter, nor a failure, by any means, and I am told by almost every one that I ask, that any proposition to repeal the law would be defeated by an overwhelming vote.

Wherever there is a "dry" town, the police force is idle and the police court sits but once a week. . In "wet" towns it sits every morning, and has plenty to do. A temperance argument of equal force can be found in the noor houses. In some of the "dry" countles none are needed. In all the "wet" counties they are found well filled .- WM. E. CURTIS, in Chicago Record.

Now Jersey makes a good showing in the recent census. Its rate of increase in population during the past decade, 30.8 per cent, is matched by no state cast of the meridian of Minnesota and Texas. The rate of increase for the entire country is less than 21 per cent, so New Jersey's increase is almost onethird above the average.

In area, New Jersey is one of the east of the States of the Union, ranking forty-second, - Delaware, Rhode Island, Connecticut being the only States that are smaller. By the census of '80, this state ranked eighteenth in population. Its gain of 488,780 people in the last ten years has carried it above Virginia and Alabama, and made it the sixteenth state in point of population. In spite of its extensive pine barrens, she has ranked third in dousity of population since 1870, and that rank she still retains, Rhodo Island and Massachusette boths the only states having more people to the square mile than New Jorsey.




