The above courses are for students who can spend three hours a day, five days a week. In addition to these afternoon classes, there are classes for school pupils from four till five-thirty on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays. In the evening there are classes from seven thirty to nine thirty, from Monday to Friday inclusive.

At this time the men are studying project of their own choosing, with the approval of the instructor, and are discussing and studying, in addition, general farm problems, such as fertilizers, sprays, and any other problems of interest and im-
