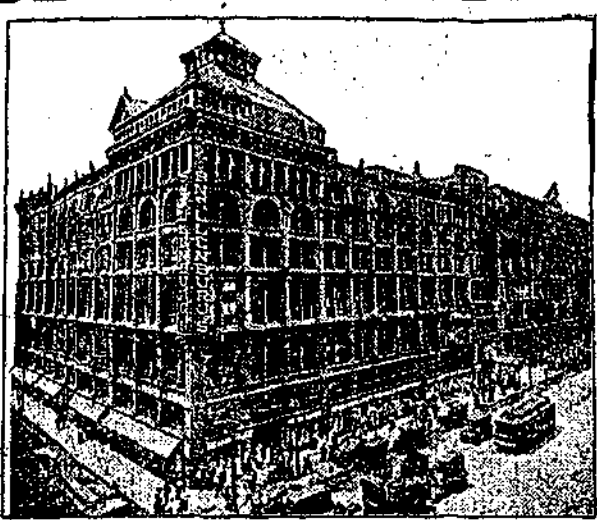

Uncle Sam, Express Companies, and our truckmen, are already doing a huge Christmas business. The local carriers will soon require push-carts.

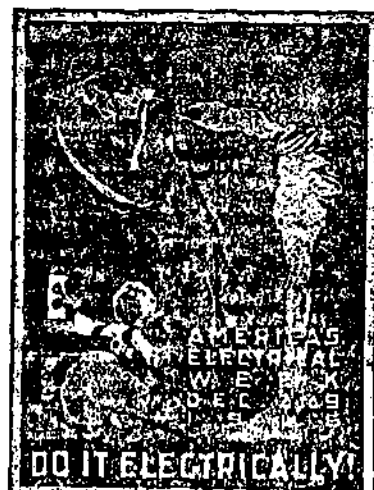
All farmers should swear to their bills, on Monday, before Town Clerk, if they want their money before Christmas.

Vocational School at Hammonton.

The regular winter session of the Vocational School has now begun, and men are enrolled for courses of study in peach growing, squab raising, strawberry and vegetable growing. Each student is enrolled to take up a definite course of study called a project, which he will carry out on the farm during the growing season.

In addition to this, the first year men are pursuing work in soils, fertilizers, shop work, and home improvement. Second year men are studying, in addition to their project, fertilizers, plant growth, business forms, home improvement and shop work. The third year men are studying, in addition to their project, animal husbandry, farm book keeping, bacteria in relation to country life, fertilizers, advanced shop work, farm arithmetic and business English.

The above courses are for students who can spend three hours a day, five days a week. In addition to these afternoon classes, there are classes for school pupils from four till five-thirty on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays. In the evening there are classes from seven-thirty to nine-thirty, from Monday to Friday inclusive.

At this time the men are studying a project of their own choosing, with the approval of the instructor, and are discussing and studying, in addition, general farm problems, such as fertilizers, sprays, and any other problems of interest and importance.

It is folly for the farmers of the section to feel that they can leave their farms during the winter and work in the city, and still be successful. The most successful men are devoting their winters to cleaning up, figuring out fertilizers and spray materials and lime, and ordering them during the winter, before prices advance; and in this way having them on hand before both they themselves and the manufacturers are too busy to give the best of attention to the matter.

The fertilizer, disease, and work at problems are becoming so important that a man cannot farm profitably without reading and studying these factors in successful farming. Enroll in the school as soon as possible, and with the assistance of the instructor study these problems, and make next year better than the last, and get a firm foundation for successful farming in the future.

Farming is becoming more and more of an intensified business. No longer can it be said that "any one can farm," because only the man who knows his business thoroughly can successfully compete in the growing and marketing of his crops.

Arrange the work on the farm so as to get into school in the afternoon from one to four; and if that isn't possible, be present at the evening sessions, which are now being held every evening. Let the school boys of fifteen and over come in for the afternoon session, at four, and then follow their instruction on the farm during the growing season.

Vocational School Instructor.

Superintendent James K. Shields, of the Anti-Saloon League of New Jersey, gave out, this week, the following statement regarding the recent election as affecting the question of local option:

"The so-called saloon vote is a harmless bug-a-boo."
