
Town Marshal.

Major General Brooke has been designated by the President as Military Governor of Cuba, a post which carries with it full control of the military and civil affairs throughout the island, as heretofore exercised by the Spanish Captain-General. Each one of the six provinces of Cuba will have its own military governor, who will receive his instructions from Gen. Brooke, and be answerable to bim.

There has been a good deal of friction between the Spanish soldiers and the Cubans in Havana, in consequence of which there have been two savage affrays, resulting in the killing and wounding of a number of people. In order to prevent further outbreaks, and to protect American citizens now in Havana, a strong naval force, consisting of the Brooklyn, Texas, Castine, and Besolute, has been ordered to the Cuban Capital.

Two sons of a wealthy Filipino visited President McKinley on Monday. They informed the President that their family had assisted Aguinaldo with a view to the annexation of the Philippines to this country, and stated that they did not favor independence. This le undoubtedly the position of the bulk of intelligent Filipines. Aguinaldo desires independence in order that he may rule over the islands as dictator, but the civilized portion of the population is against him.

JAPAN'S NEW WARSHIP neter Fighting Machine ' onn to Be

Added to the Mikada's Navy. In two years, at the outside, the strength of the Japanese pavy will be represented by about 250,000 tons of displacement. Japan's largest and most formidable man-of-war is the Fujl, named after the highest mountain in Japan, having a toppage of 12,649, which figures represent the exact height of the mountain in feel.

The Fujl was ordered from the Arm strong-Whitworth Company, England, with her sister ship, the Yashima, in June, 1894, two months before the outbreak of the China-Japanese war, and arrived at Yokohama, the central naval station of Japan, on Oct. 31, 1897. The Fuji is a first-class battle-ship, with a displacement of 12,649 tons and 13,687 horse-power, with a speed of eighteen and a quarter knots an bour. The dimensions are: Length, 406 feet 6 inches: breadth at th eboradest part. 73 feet; main draught, 26.3 feet. Her armament consists of four twelve-inch Armstrong guns, ten six-iuch Armstrong quick firers, twenty three-pound quick firers, four two and a half-pound quick firers and five torpedo tubes.

The Fujl is painted a white gray, the color of the Japanese warships. Her funnels are placed fore and aft, instead







tic's in All Saloons. The manufacture of genuine French absinthe is the latest American industry. This is guaranteed to be the real stuff, straight from the boulevards

Franco-maniacs who frequent the cheap table d'hote restaurants of the upper cast and west sides imbibe this stuff, which in an arrangement of complicated glasses is allowed to drip into a glass of water, where it acquires an opaque hue: The absinthe is pre-viously a clear light green liquid. It is made from the common worm-wood which is found in many old New Bugland gardens and from which a thick oil is distilled. It has been found by an examination of custom-house exports that sixty years ago large quantities o this American wormwood were ex ported from New York and Vermont to France, where it was used in making

But so large has the home consun tion now grown that we now use all the wormwood for our own production, a well as five times as much which is imported from Germany and France. The American worm wood is regarded as the best in the world. Another expensive herb that is grown here is saffron, which is worth from \$6 to \$8 per pound Until quite recently the supply of saffron came from Vermont, but a severe drought there killed most of the plants and the price has increased in cansequence. In many Western States, as well as in Mexico, it has since been artificially propagated.


In Michigan there are vast fields o pepperaitat, which is cultivated caro fully and sells for a high price. Another medicinal herb grown in Michigan is sage, which is sold at \$140 per ton, in addition to which 100° tons of mage are imported into the United States every year at a value of \$80 per ton, mest of it coming from Italy. In the mountains of North Carolius and Pennossee boneset, pennyroyal and thorn apple leaves are cultivated, as well as mandrake, bloodroot and black cohosh, all of which are used in patent medicine. California and Cape Cod are the homes of horehound, which wakes a cough medicine. This country raises a greater variety

of medicinal herbs than any other, pro-Jucing those that grow in cold and hot climates, as well as those that thrive on dry mountain tops and in the bumid valleys. Burdock, augelien and bayperry are some of these roots and others are spikenard, unicorn root, cascarilia, cramp back, thyme and pigeon berry.-New York Journal.




