Town Council Meeting.

A special meeting was held Tuesday
evening, Dec. 16th. Present, Messrs.
Ballard, Boyer, DeFay, and Holman.

A communication received from the
United States Mortgage & Trust Co., of
New York, stating that the \$45,000
water bonds were ready for delivery,
and enclosing a sample of same.

The bill for above, \$159.50, was order-
ed paid.

Arrangements were made to meet an
official of the railroads, at a time to be
appointed.

C. B. Williams & Co., Philadelphia,
stated that their representative would
meet the Council and offer their bid for
water-bonds. Thursday evening named.

A Gas Company desiring a franchise
in Hammonton asked for an appointment
to meet Council to present their case,
with explanations. They make gas
particularly for fuel, but will furnish for
lighting. Wednesday evening decided
upon.

Adjourned.

On Wednesday evening Mr. W. S.
Graham, a member of the City Council,
Ocean City, and Mr. E. S. Star, mem-
bers of the New Gas Company, met the
Council and stated their desire to obtain
a franchise,—presenting an ordinance
for the purpose, which was referred to
Solicitor Chandler. They will furnish
fuel gas not to exceed \$1.35 per thous-
and feet, and illuminating gas at \$1.50.
The company offer a bond of \$1000 to
have the plant complete in one year
from granting of ordinance.

Council gathered on Thursday eve-
ning, but Williams & Co. failed to appear.
Probably too short notice.

Do you realize that to-day is the

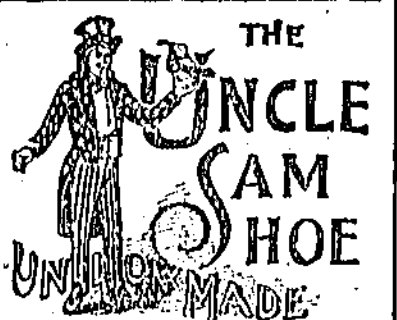
