

**DEER SEASON ENDS**

The open season for shooting deer closed at sundown Wednesday. Today hundreds of residents of this section are enjoying venison served in various styles, at their homes and in club halls. Two hundred members of the Hammonton Union League, counted invited friends, held a venison banquet in the new Masonic Temple, this place.

The venison came from bucks killed in the Atlantic and Burlington county swamps during the last two days of the deer killing season, bucks brought down by members of the Union League, led by Peter T. Ranere, of this place, known in three states as "King of the Deer Hunters." Ranere each year leads parties, comprising from twenty to thirty crack shots, into the almost impenetrable swamps of Atlantic and Burlington counties, and, always, his parties close the season with the biggest bags of deer of any in this section. This year, however, Ranere's party of deer hunters and another of twenty from Blue Anchor, a farming section, ran a nip and tuck race.

Ranere is vehement in his denunciation of the game laws as practiced by numerous hunters this year. These men, on off days of the season, run down the deer with dogs, which is contrary to the law. Ranere has information that one party of Burlington county hunters has killed fifty deer in this illegal manner. On all sides, says dogs have been brought into play. The offenses are more numerous and flagrant in Burlington county, just over the Hammonton district line, but are also practiced in the Weymouth swamps; less than ten miles from Hammonton and a bare dozen miles from Atlantic City.

Not only do the dogs trail down the deer for these law breaking hunters, but kill and maul many, some dying in the swamps, others being driven so deep into these inaccessible spots that they are not even sighted again during the open season. Ranere advocates a fine of \$500 or six months in jail for this illegal use of dogs, or that all hunters be permitted to use the animals, and that the season be kept open for successive days, not one day a week as at present.
