TO UNIFY CONGREGATIONS

One of the first steps in a movement to have congregations in rural communities unite in attendance at a single church has been taken by the Rev. W. M. McDowell, pastor of the Presbyterian Church at Elwood, six miles from Hammonton. Pastor McDowell has invited the congregation of the Brainard M. E. Church, of that place, to unite in worship with his flock, the arrangement to be permanent if found satisfactory.

LOWER COST OF ROAD WORK

The first retrenchment in the cost of road work in this section has been brought about through the influence of Councilman P. A. Colasurdo, chairman of the Highway Committee of Council. Colasurdo urged that the wages of those employed upon the highways be reduced to 35 cents per hour from 40 cents, and for teams with driver from \$7.20 a day to \$6.50, to keep pace with the lowered cost of living. Council, by a unanimous vote, adopted the recommendation of the chairman of the Highway Committee.

WILL SELL MIDDLE ROAD SCHOOL

The Middle Road school house and the land on which the building is located, will be sold at public sale, the annual school meeting having so voted. The taxpayers also authorized the holding of a public meeting at which a building program is to be agreed upon, that the Board of Education might be able to properly house the fast-growing number of pupils, many of whom are now being taught but one session a day.

AN AWFUL TIME

One of the most amusing incidents ever reported as occurring in the local schools has just been made public, and is causing much merriment here. WILL WEAR METAL HELMETS

Hammonton firemen will be equipped, in part, with metal helmets, that they may be well protected when engaged in fighting fires where hot embers are falling upon them. Each of the pieces of motor driven fire apparatus will carry four of these helmets.

NEED MORE POLICE

The 1921 budget will call for an appropriation of \$5000 for the police department, compared to \$4200 last year, and a bare \$1000 per year prior to the war. Even at the \$5000 mark it is the opinion of many that still more officers should be employed, that there might be full protection afforded all the town, part of the police to patrol the suburban sections, while the others are on duty in the centre of the town.

WAS ROBBERY INTENDED

The authorities have been investigating a peculiar case of a robbery here Sunday night. One half past ten, a neighbor of the Batchelor, living on Upper Bellevue avenue, noticed a Ford car standing near the Batchelor home, and flashlight being used in the rear of the place. The neighbor called up the Batchelor house and the occupants in turn called up the police.

Shortly after help had arrived three bicyclists were noticed coming down Bellevue avenue. They were stopped and questioned, and stated they had ridden up Bellevue avenue a short time before and had been stoned. According to one of those who answered the police call, a shower of stones greeted the lads on their return trip also, but a search failed to locate the culprits.

Council has this year included \$300 in the annual budget under the item of Shade Tree Commission. This is taken to indicate that it is the purpose to create such a Commission, a project which has been discussed here for ten years past. That there is need of such a body every lover of trees admits, as only through the efforts of such a body will the noble trees which for many years have been a delight to Hammontonians and visitors be retained.

HAD HOOR IN CAE





IREMEN PASS STRONG RESOLUTIONS
At a joint meeting of the Hammonton fire companies a resolution was adopted commending the action of Mayor Charles Cunningham in ignoring the recommendations of the firemen that Henry M. Phillips had declined to serve as Assistant Chief the Mayor and Town Council in further proof of their wisdom requested the fire companies to recommend a man for the position of Assistant Chief after having turned down, out of hand, the recommendation already made by the fire companies, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, by the fire companies of Hammonton, in joint meeting assembled, that we do hereby most earnestly protest against the action of the Mayor and Town Council in refusing to appoint those recommended by the fire companies for Chief and Assistant Chief, and that we especially and emphatically protest against the action of the Mayor and Town Council in requesting the fire companies to make a second recommendation for the position of Assistant Chief, after the Mayor and Town Council had refused absolutely to act favorably on the recommendation already made, and be it further

RESOLVED, That a copy of these resolutions be transmitted to the Mayor and Town Council of the Town of Hammonton, and that the resolutions be spread upon the minutes of each fire company and given to the press.
The committee in charge of this action is composed of former Assemblyman Thomas C. Elvins, George Berry and William O. Hoyt.

OVERSEER OF POOR REPORTS
Mrs. Maybelle Cunningham, wife of Mayor Charles Cunningham, and Hammonton's first Overseer of the Poor, last night tendered her report for the year 1920 to Council.
The report stated that during the past year clothing had been purchased for needy persons to the amount of \$150.27, coal amounting to \$34.10, food and milk, \$220.15; shoes, rubbers and leather, \$68.25; board, rent and household bills, \$430.27; medical and hospital, \$15; nurse for G. A. R. veteran, \$10; jitney hire, carfare, stamps, telephone and telegraph, \$66.24; salary, \$180; a total of \$1322.23. Balance carried over, \$877.72.

Some items in the report are as follows: Number adults helped, 24; children helped, 49; deaths, 1; almshouse inmates, 3; discharged from poor department, 1; State institution inmates, 18; sent to other county, 1. Also one immigrant refused admission into United States, as he was unable to care for family and had periodic spells of insanity.




A famine, alarming in its proportions, today holds in its grip several important provinces in China. The crop failure is complete, and the present distress, which is great, is likely, before winter has run its course, to become appalling. The actual famine zone covers 100,000 square miles with a population of 45,000,000 Chinese, cause nearly one and one-half years of continuous drought, during which the normal rainfall has decreased from 25 inches a year to less than 8 inches. **NUMBERS**—45,000,000 Chinese are directly affected; 15,000,000 are facing immediate starvation and will die without our help; 10,000 are already dying daily.

WHAT IT MEANS TO CHINA—The famine, unless halted by American relief, means the break-up of civilization in North China; in fact the complete collapse of a vast region commercially, economically and morally, which is certain to persist for a generation to come.



Pleas for Europe's Helpless Children



"They are no more my children than yours" is Herbert Hoover's homely yet eloquent plea for 3,500,000 European children who face incredible tragedy this winter unless America comes to their rescue. The funds by which American aid has been feeding millions have run out, and that the work may not stop and thus precipitate what would amount to "a massacre of the innocents" seven other great American relief organizations have united with Mr. Hoover's organization under the name of the European Relief Council in a joint appeal for funds. The collaborating agencies are the American Red Cross, the American Friends Service Committee (Quakers), the Jewish Joint Distribution Committee, the Federal Churches of Christ in America—the Knights of Columbus, the Y. M. C. A. and the Y. W. C. A.

LAUNCH VAST EFFORT FOR EUROPE'S YOUNG

Eight American Relief Agencies
Combine to Save 3,500,000
Children Death Menaces.

Eight great relief organizations, working strong and for every race and creed, have united under the name of the European Relief Council to coordinate child relief in Europe this winter. The Council will seek to provide funds for 3,500,000 starving and diseased children in Eastern and Central Europe and to administer this relief economically.

It consists of Herbert Hoover, chairman, and Franklin K. Lane, treasurer; Edgar Rickard, representing the American Relief Administration; Dr. Livingston Farrand, representing the American Red Cross; Felix Warburg, representing the Jewish Joint Distribution Committee; Wilbur K. Thomas, representing the American Friends Service Committee (Quakers); James A. Flaherty, representing the Knights of Columbus; Dr. C. V. Hubbard, representing the Young Men's Christian Association; Miss Sarah S. Lyon, representing the Young Women's Christian Association; Dr. Arthur Brown, representing the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America.

It is the purpose of the Council to raise \$25,000,000 in an appeal centering at the Christmas holidays, to the end that the desperate situation regarding child life may be met. In every town and community of the nation, it is planned, local committees, representing all the co-operating agencies will be formed to secure the vitally necessary funds. Of the amount sought, \$25,000,000 will be used for food and \$10,000,000 for medical services.

For every one of these American dollars the local governments and communities aided will furnish two dollars, in the form of transportation, labor, goods, clerical help, cash contributions and such food supplies as are locally obtainable. No children receive the free food except after medical tests showing them to be seriously undernourished. The remaining \$10,000,000 of the fund is just as urgently needed for medical services to the children.

The European Relief Council will do much more than effect donations in the raising of the child saving fund. It will, with the inspecting forces of eight great agencies, keep a constant eye on the administration of America's merciful gift, in order that there shall be no waste and no tendency toward nepotism.

"This is the largest co-operative benevolent organization ever attempted in the United States," Mr. Hoover says. "The organizations represented have come to the unanimous, though independently formed conclusion, that prompt and united action by the whole American people can avert incredible tragedy for the helpless children involved. The organizations forming the Council will organize their representatives in every town and community of the nation for the raising of the necessary funds."
