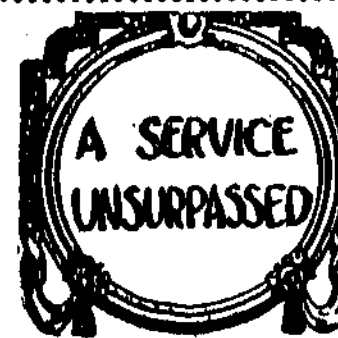

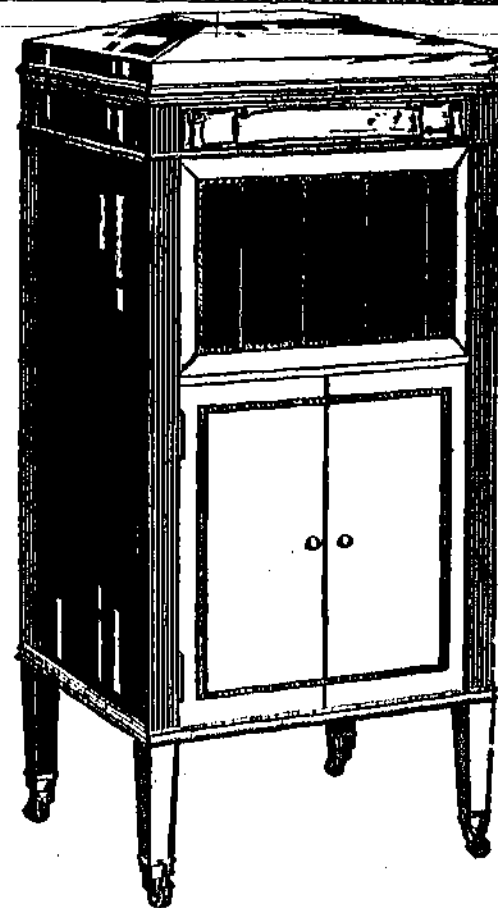

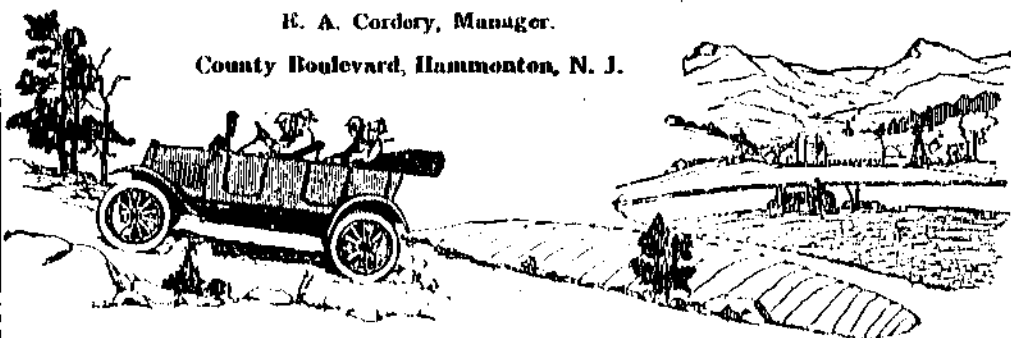

**CHURCH DIGNITARIES
ADVOCATE THRIFT

Cardinal Gibbons' letter follows: "Every American citizen should realize that the problems arising from the war are individual problems, and can be solved by careful, frugal living and a curtailing of unnecessary expense. The prosperity that has come to us is not ours to be spent lavishly, but is ours to be conserved for the benefit of our country and our fellow citizens. It is to be increased by consistent saving, thoughtful husbandry, and wise use. In no other way can we seize the opportunity that is presented us, and thus while increasing our own resources, continue to play the Good Samaritan to the suffering people in Europe."

In commenting on the fine spirit of cooperation of the American prelates, William Mather Lewis, National Savings Director, stated that it should not require another Joseph to point out to us that the savings for the year 1926 should be piled up during the years of plenty which we are now experiencing.

The government in continuing the sale of Savings Stamps and Treasury Savings Certificates is making a safe and sure way of increasing savings, available to every school child, to every man and woman, who is a part of the population of a nation.

"This country, as well as the nations of Europe should pay careful heed to the Government's slogan, 'We must work more and talk less.' We must particularly be willing to weigh the words of our leaders, who are not at all in error in saying that to prevent disaster we must 'Work and Save.'"
