FOLSON OFFERS REWARD

No success having attended the efforts in the apprehension of the parties responsible for the destruction by fire, after apparent bombing of the place, of "Hotel Schults," on May 20, the borough officials have voted to pay a reward of \$500 for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the culprits. Not only was the place fired, and probably through the medium of a bomb with a time fuse, but a telegraph pole two miles away was chopped down and the wires cut, to prevent fire engines from Hammononton responding to an alarm. The premises were totally destroyed, the loss being about \$15,000, several thousand dollars of which represented well goods in the cellar.

HONOR HEROES

Officials of the local camp of the P. O. S. of A. conducted the exercises, assisted by members of Frederick A. Funston Post, No. 186, American Legion.

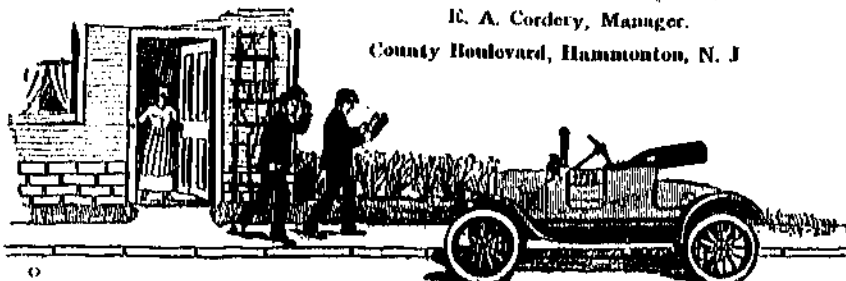

None of these were approved by the Chamber of Commerce, which introduced an entirely new combination, the maroon and white adopted last night.

HOLD PHILADELPHIAN
 The Coroner's Jury last night held Jack A. Brodie, of Philadelphia, responsible for the death of Anthony Rano, who died as the result of injuries received a week ago last Sunday, while a passenger in the Ford car of Alphonzo Zizone, when the car of the latter crashed into the Cadillac car of Brodie's, and Rano was hurled thirty feet through the air, striking the curb, sustaining injuries which caused his death at the West Jersey Hospital, Camden. From the evidence it appears that Zizone was going at a good rate of speed, that he did not see Brodie's car until he was within a few feet of it, but the members of the Coroner's Jury evidently paid much weight to the contention that Zizone had the right of way, and placed the burden of the responsibility on the outside man.

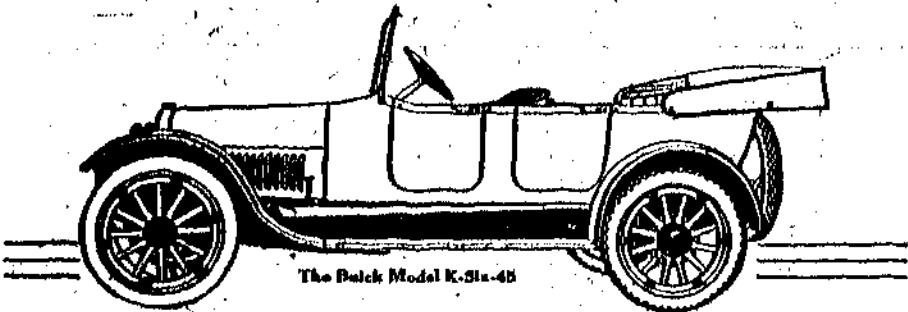
