PENNA. CONSTABULARY HERE

It has become public that on Monday last, while the plans were under way for the arrest of the individual supposed to be "The Crank" in the Coughlin kidnaping case, that those in charge of the big force of operatives were stationed here. Immediately upon receipt of a message that the culprit had been captured the Chief and his assistants left here in a high powered car for Egg Harbor City. The big force of men was used to cover the entire countryside, presumably to give battle in the event of the man under surveillance having allies in a motor car, or his escape in the swamp in this section. Mayor Adolph Goller, and others, are of the opinion that the man arrested had at least one other man working with him and that his accomplice, frightened at the dramatic conclusion of their plans, dashed into the swamp and made his escape.

HAMMONTON NOTES

The members of the Women's Civic Club held a thimble-bee last Wednesday afternoon at the home of Mrs. A. B. Holman. The monthly meeting of the organization was held this Tuesday evening in the club-house on Bellevue avenue.

Mayor Cunningham took the Camp to task for lack of courtesy in publishing an open letter that gambling on the streets had been permitted, and was informed that he had been written concerning the same and no reply had been received. The Mayor stated that he had not received the letter.
The gambling referred to was piled openly here during the stay of a carnival, several thousand dollars of money being taken in by the people of Hammonton going into the pockets of the crooks who plied their unlawful game.

WHO TOOK BILLY DANSEY?

Interest in the outcome of the arrest of the individual known as "The Crank" continues here. Some persons are inclined to think he may be a former resident of this place, whose name was similar to that given out by the authorities.
There is a slight inclination to link child with that of Billy Dansey, those having this belief being under the impression that the Dansey child died while in the kidnaper's care.
Although the Danseys were not well to do, and could not have paid a large sum for ransom of the child, yet that may have been unknown to the culprits, urge these persons. If it can be shown that the kidnaper of the Coughlin child had an accomplice, then the theories of these people becomes more tenable, as it is the impression of those in touch with the case here that two men were concerned. The selection of the spot for the placing of the ransom money, about eight miles from the spot it is believed Billy Dansey was carried to is viewed as significant by those holding the above views.

GOOD WOMAN LAID TO REST

Funeral services were held here Sunday over the remains of Mrs. Emma Weacost, aged 47 years, wife of William H. Weacost, a well known resident of this place. Private services were held at the late home of the deceased, also in the Baptist Church. A short service was also held at Pleasant Mills cemetery by Rev. Charles N. Newell. She was a devoted mother and wife, a Christian woman, and a member of the Baptist Church.

WHY NOT ACT ON DANSEY CASE?

The successful work of the Government officials in the Coughlin case has aroused renewed interest in the Dansey case. Eight months ago today Charles S. White and Mrs. Edith L. Jones were taken into custody and remanded to Mays Landing jail. Not the slightest effort has been made during those eight months to indict the accused man and woman, and citizens here feel that early clearcut action is the only honest course that can be taken.
To bring the case before the Grand Jury or to come out and openly exonerate the accused is the plain duty of the county officials, in the opinion of nine out of every ten Hammontonians. "Just think," says one leading citizen of Hammonton, "had the honest course proceedings not been resorted to this had and would still be continued in the county jail. Why don't they act one way or the other. It is the only manly course to pursue." Such is the consensus of opinion here.

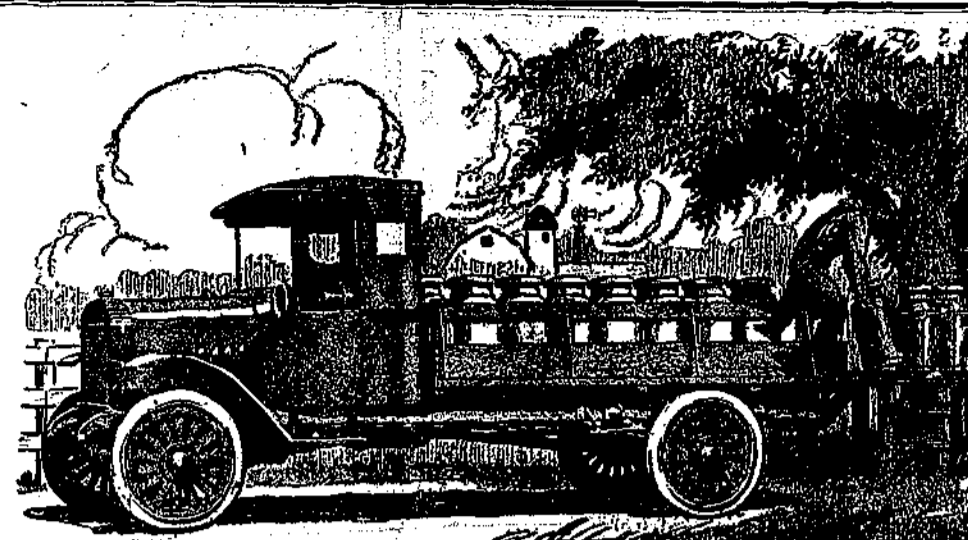



NOTICE

Ordinance for Extension of Sewer.

An ordinance providing for the extension of the sewer along Pleasant Street between Second Street and Egg Harbor Road in the Town of Hammonton, Atlantic County, New Jersey, and providing that such extension shall be undertaken as a local improvement with assessment of benefits.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Town of Hammonton in Council assembled, that the sewer now existing under and along Pleasant Street shall be extended under and along said Pleasant Street in a westerly direction from the place where said sewer now existing ends at the intersection of said Pleasant Street with Second Street to a point distant two hundred and eighty-five (285) feet therefrom, in accordance with the plans and specifications therefor approved by Town Council.

Section 2. And be it ordained that the extension of said sewer as aforesaid shall be undertaken as a local improvement.

Section 3. And be it further ordained that the cost of such extension of said sewer shall be paid for in the first instance by the issuance of temporary improvement notes which shall mature in not exceeding one year from their date, and shall bear interest at not exceeding six per centum per annum, and which said notes may from time to time be renewed by the issuance of new notes of such maturity and rate of interest as the Town Council in its wisdom may determine.

Section 4. And be it further ordained that upon the completion of the work of extending said sewer there shall be assessed upon each lot or real estate which may be benefited by said improvement such portion or expense as will equal the amount of benefits actually acquired by such lot or real estate in the manner as now provided by law. Said assessment of benefits shall be used for the payment or retirement of the temporary improvement notes which may be issued as hereinafore provided. If the benefits so assessed shall not equal the cost and expense of the improvement, or shall be insufficient to fully pay or retire the said temporary improvement notes, then the balance shall be paid by the Town at large.

Section 5. And be it further ordained that this ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Notice is hereby given that the foregoing ordinance was introduced at a regular meeting of the Council of the town of Hammonton, held on the 28th day of July, 1920, and that at a regular meeting to be held in the Council Chamber in the Town Hall on the 11th day of August, 1920, at the hour of eight o'clock in the evening, the said Council will consider the final passage of said ordinance.
