Fletcher Doesn't Trust Mexico

Warning against premature recognition of the new Mexican government has been given the administration by Henry F. Fletcher, former ambassador to Mexico. In a letter to Paulding Colby, secretary of state, he argues that in no case should the recognition of the De la Huerta government be given until the situation in Mexico is such that it is a definite character, with the understanding that even this would be withdrawn should subsequent events prove that it was prematurely extended.

Mr. Fletcher's letter consisted of two pages. It was written in the office of the state department and Dr. Ignace Donnelly, Mexican high commissioner to the United States, regarding recognition of the new government at Mexico City.

Dr. Ignace Donnelly has assured the American government that the administration of the new regime is up to the obligations of a government, but that such property as they were despoiled of before any recognition was extended without compensation would be returned to them.

He also urges the American administration to permit the building of a canal through the Isthmus of Panama, a project which would benefit the United States.
