Woman's purty has announced the completion of preparations for a campaign to obtain national and state legislation removing political, civil, and legal discrimination against women.

A proposed equal rights amendment to the federal Constitution has been drafted by counsel for the party to be introduced in the senate by Senator Curtles of Kansas, and in the house by Representative Fess of Ohio. The text of the proposed amendment follows:

"Section 1. No political, civil, or legal disabilities or inequalities on accidence."
