"WAY DOWN EAST"

The finest creation that has come from the brain of D. W. Griffith is said to be his latest production, "Way Down East," now being shown twice daily at the Chestnut Street Opera House, Philadelphia. It is an elaboration of the stage play of the same name by Lottie Blair Parker, which ran for twenty-two consecutive seasons upon the legitimate stage under the management of William A. Brady. Mr. Griffith paid Mr. Brady \$175,000 for the motion picture rights to the play for the greatest price ever paid for the rights to any play. It has seemed a strange thing for Mr. Griffith to pay such a price when any quantity of stage successes, readily adaptable to motion pictures, were obtainable at a fractional part of that enormous sum. Mr. Griffith, in discussing this recently, said: "I selected 'Way Down East' because I felt that in these days of extravagant living and excessive rest we all need to have brought home to us the wholesomeness of this simple story of plain people. It is indeed a human story humanly told, and speaks eloquently of the simple faith and high moral standards which our fathers and mothers have given us as a heritage, and which have made our country and our women the greatest and most glorious on earth. We have altogether too many plays and pictures of the other kind today, treating lightly of the home and the marriage vow, and I think it is very refreshing to turn aside from the vampire and the chameleon to the scenes of our country. And then, too, I think rural life in America is worthy of historical preservation. It is being crowded out by the 'estate,' and the old barn with its pungent odors is compelled to give place to the garage and the smell of gasoline."

"Way Down East" is said to represent ten months' constant work by Mr. Griffith and his associates, at a total cost in excess of eight hundred thousand dollars. This indicates that he has bestowed upon it the usual care and attention to detail for which he is famous. The narrative of the stage play has been closely followed with elaborations for the purpose of increasing the scenic and dramatic values. In fact, it would be impossible to put into a stage production a scene as realistic and powerful as the blinding snowstorm or Anna's rescue from the ice-choked river. But the greatness of "Way Down East" lies not in its effects or photography, wonderful though they may be, rather in the delightful comedy and sentimental drama that touch the most human emotions.

If ever a cast be said to be truly "all-star" it is that selected by Mr. Griffith for this production. The leading roles are enacted by Lillian Gish and Ripon Cushing, both well-known for the important parts they have played in previous Griffith productions. And then there are Burr Melnitz and Vera Orseno who will at once be recalled for their portrayals of the Square and the group in the original stage production. In addition there are Kate Bruce, Lowell Sherman, Creighton Hale, Mary Hay, Edgar Nelson, George Kelle, Porter Strong, Mrs. Morgan Belmont (a new York social leader), and many others.

HAMMONTON'S FIRST LADY JURY
 On Monday last, before George E. Strouse, Justice of the Peace, in the Small Cause Court, the ladies of Hammonton had their first experience in jury service. The following ladies had the pleasure of serving for the first time: Lina Bellamy, forelady; Alice Brown, Theresa Rubba, Anna Bauer, Lillian Platt, Lola Burdick, Margaret Davis, Bebeva Simons, Rose Russo.
 On the jury the following men also served with the ladies: H. W. Rogers, Ralph Rudderow, Antonio Cappuccino.
 The matter on controversy was a suit by one Peter Capelli against Oransius Carpo. Capelli claimed that Carpo's chickens had gone on his land and eaten some rye and also that one of Carpo's pigs had escaped one day and eaten apples, and that a cow had broken away from the stake to which it had been chained on Carpo's land, gone over on Capelli's land and trampled on corn. Carpo, on the other hand, claimed that he had a fence and kept his chickens at home and that it was Capelli's own chickens that had done the damage and that, as to the pig, Capelli had said the pig had done no damage. One of the interesting points, however, was concerning the cow; one of Capelli's witnesses testified at the first trial which was held on October 25, and resulted in a disagreement, that forty or fifty hills of corn had been trampled on, but at the second trial, the number of hills had grown to from ninety to a hundred. Some of the ladies thought it remarkable that the hills could grow to such an extent in such a short time.
 The ladies made excellent jurors, listened intently to all the testimony and the arguments of counsel and endeavored to reach a proper verdict, but unfortunately, they could not all agree to the same thing and another disagreement resulted. The majority being in favor of finding for the defendant while a few favored the plaintiff and thought the plaintiff ought to have a few dollars, while the others thought he had suffered no damage.
 Mayor Cunningham, who attended Mrs. Carpo, made an excellent witness. Four witnesses were produced by the plaintiff while the defendant offered eight.
 Attorney William B. Phillips, who represented the plaintiff, in his argument to the jury discussed the high value of rye as a fertilizer and stated that it gathered nitrogen from the air and that nitrogen was worth seventeen cents a pound, he failed to state, however, how much rye was required to make a pound. The omission left the ladies in the dark as to whether the damage should be seventeen cents or more.
 Attorney Dean Stanley Renwick, who represented the defendant, said that the whole matter was a "tempest in a teapot" and that the defendant had done no injury to the plaintiff; that it was the plaintiff's own chickens that had eaten the rye and quoted profusely from the Holy Scripture, particularly that part wherein man's duty is defined as two-fold: first, to love God and second, to love his neighbor and illustrated the latter by the story of the Good Samaritan.
