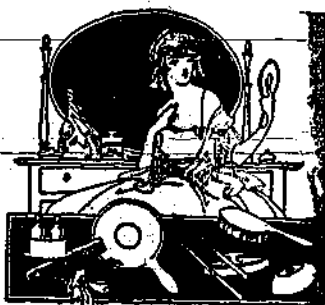
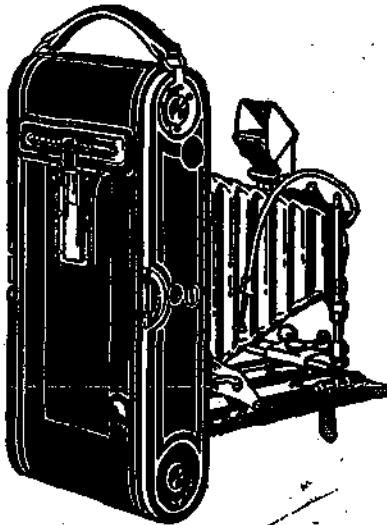


SENATOR JOHN A. ACKLEY

ARE LAID TO REST
Many of the officials of the Hammononton Trust Company on Monday attended the funeral of J. Nelson Ake, who was killed by a falling pole at a fire in Egg Harbor City. Deceased was a director of the Hammononton Trust Company and a leading business man here. The Trust Company building is draped in mourning.

DEAD MAN IDENTIFIED
The remains of a man found by hunters the day before Thanksgiving in the Weymouth swamp, have been identified by William Hess, of Frankford, as those of his father, William Hess, Sr., aged 71 years, who disappeared from his home in Frankford three years ago. The deceased came to his death through a pistol shot, evidently self-inflicted, a note found in his pocket stating that he had reached his last dollar and would part with it in death. The victim is supposed to have lived in Pleasantville a portion of the time that elapsed since his disappearance in 1917. He is survived by a wife and the son making the identification, William Hess, Jr.

LOCAL NEWS
Mr. and Mrs. Louis Rice, of Hallowood avenue, the former an ardent deer hunter, are receiving congratulations on the arrival of a little deer of their own, a smiling baby girl.
Pupils of the Folsom public schools will hold an interesting Christmas entertainment in the school at that place next week.
Harry P. Mottola, acting chief of police, has recovered several pairs of trousers which were originally stolen from the Rice Manufacturing Company at this place. They were part of the \$3000 worth of booty taken, and are said to have fallen off the truck at Ronedale, where a resident of that place found them in the road.
The mystery of the looting of the Hammononton Auto Station still remains unsolved. Peter T. Ilanero, proprietor of the garage, states that the intruders got away with \$4000 worth of tires and tubes, on which there was no insurance for theft.
The public schools at this place reopened Monday after being closed for two weeks past because of the presence of acetic fever among some of the pupils.

SOLDIERS QUIT AMATOL
For several months past detachments of men from Camp Dix have been quartered at Amatol Arsenal, engaged in salvaging work. Army trucks, running between this place and Camp Dix, have been a common sight. Tomorrow, or Sunday morning at the latest, will see the last of these men, as orders have been issued for all men to return to Camp Dix, and no more are to be sent.
This is taken to mean, by some, that the possibility of Amatol becoming a training camp has gone a glimmering, by others that the War Department has temporarily discontinued sending men here because of the cold weather, the facilities for keeping the men comfortable being greater at Camp Dix. The fact that men frequently become intoxicated while visiting here, despite the presence of military police, may have had some influence in causing the removal of the men.

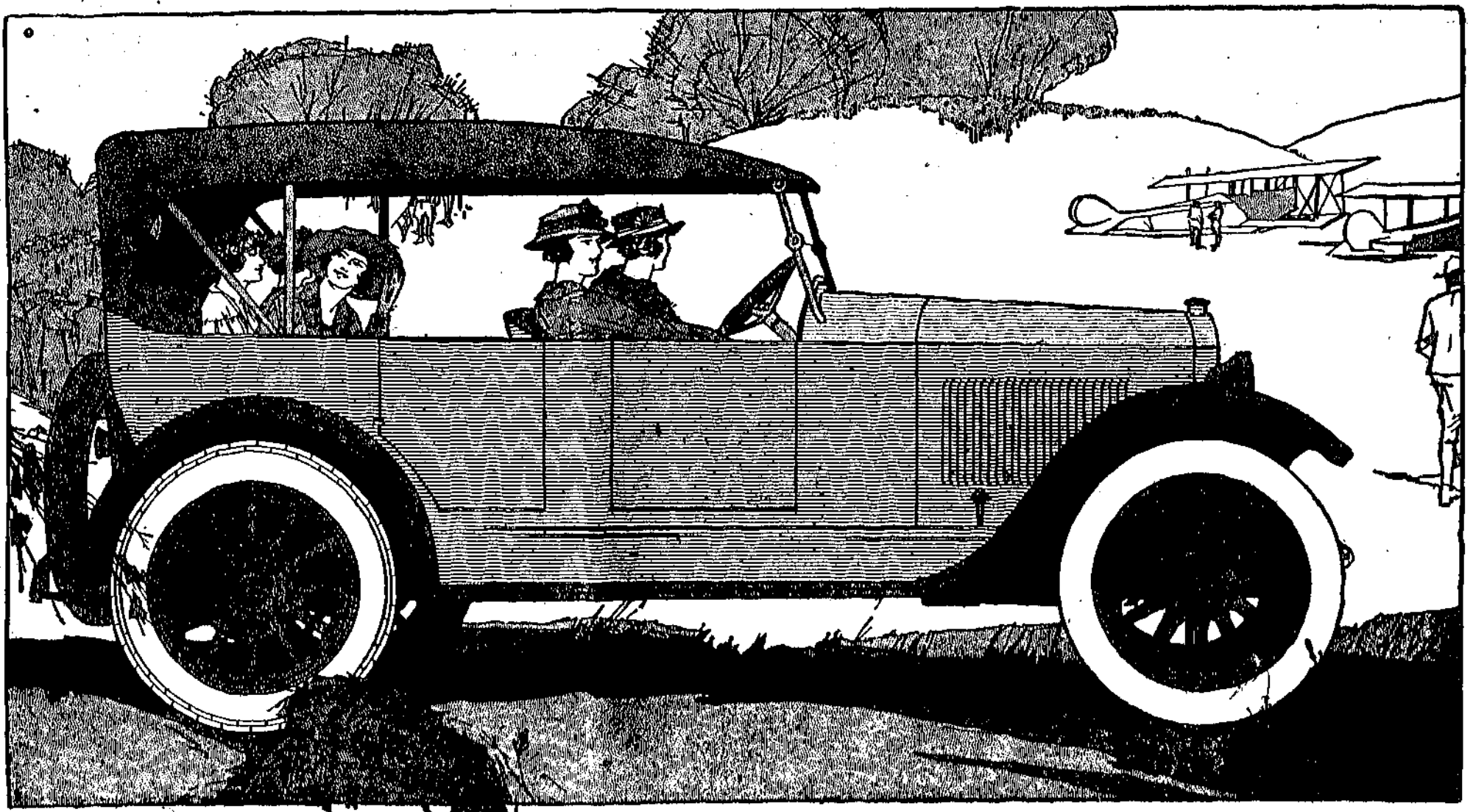

PROPOSALS FOR COLLECTION AND REMOVAL OF GARBAGE
Sealed bids or proposals endorsed "Proposals for Collection and Removal of Garbage within certain limits of the Town of Hammonton," with the name or names of the person or persons making the bid, will be received by the Town Council, at the Council Room on December 22, 1920, at eight o'clock P. M., during a session of said Council.

The work to be done under the above title by which bids will be tested, is the collection, carting and removal of all garbage (ashes not included) for the year 1921; three times a week during the month of July and first two weeks of August; daily (except Sunday) last two weeks of August and first two weeks of September. Twice a week during the months of April, May, June, latter half of September and month of October; once a week during November, December, January, February and March. Garbage district to be bounded as follows:
Pratt street to Maple street, Fourth street—Valley avenue—to Grand street, including both sides of boundary lines.

All garbage to be removed in watertight covered wagons or carts. Contractors will be required to furnish a bond satisfactory to the Town Council in the amount of \$300.00 for the faithful performance of his contract and duties thereunder. Name of proposed bondman or bondsmen should accompany bid. Bids must state where bidders would dispose all garbage collected. The Town Council reserves the right to reject any or all bids if it shall deem it for the public interest to do so. All bids should be addressed to W. R. Seely, Town Clerk, plainly marked "Proposal for Collection and Removal of Garbage Within Certain Limits of the Town of Hammonton," and the name of the bidder.

ORDINANCES INTRODUCED FIXING SALARIES

An ordinance entitled, "AN ORDINANCE fixing the salary of Town Clerk of the Town of Hammonton, in the County of Atlantic and State of New Jersey."

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Town of Hammonton, in Council assembled: That the salary of the Town Clerk, of the Town of Hammonton, Atlantic County, New Jersey, shall be and is hereby fixed at Nine Hundred and Fifty Dollars per annum, to be paid in equal monthly installments.

Section 2. And be it further ordained, that this ordinance shall go into effect on the first day of the year nineteen hundred and twenty-one, and that all ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance be, and the same are hereby repealed.

AN ORDINANCE entitled, "AN ORDINANCE FIXING THE SALARY OF THE TOWN COLLECTOR, THE TOWN TREASURER, AND THE COLLECTOR OF WATER RENTS, of the Town of Hammonton, in the County of Atlantic and State of New Jersey."

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Town of Hammonton, in Council assembled: That the salary of the Town Collector and the Town Treasurer, of the Town of Hammonton, Atlantic County, New Jersey, shall be and is hereby fixed at Twelve Hundred Dollars per annum, to be paid in equal monthly installments.

Section 2. That the said salary, as hereby fixed, shall be in compensation for the office of the Town Collector and the Town Treasurer, also Collector of Water Rents, of the Town of Hammonton.

Section 3. That this ordinance shall go into effect, January first, 1921, and that all ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance be, and the same are hereby repealed.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that the foregoing ordinance were introduced and passed first reading at a regular meeting of the Town Council of the Town of Hammonton, on December 13, 1920, and that the same will come up for final consideration and passage, at a regular meeting of said Town Council to be held on Wednesday, December 22, 1920, at eight o'clock in the evening, at the Town Hall on Vine street, in said Town of Hammonton.

ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE Granting consent by the Town of Hammonton, to the Littlefield Ice and Coal Company, and the Hammonton and Egg Harbor City Gas Company, permission to lay a drain under the surface of certain streets, in the Town of Hammonton, for the purpose of carrying off the excess condensation and water, from the plants of the Littlefield Ice and Coal Company, and the Hammonton and Egg Harbor City Gas Company.

WHEREAS, the Littlefield Ice and Coal Company, and the Hammonton and Egg Harbor City Gas Company, desire to lay a drain under the surface of Lincoln street, to Twelfth street, thence to West End avenue, thence to Orchard street; thence, to the Town ditch on Railroad avenue, paralleling the Pennsylvania Railroad tracks; for the purpose of carrying off the excess condensation and water, from the plants of the Littlefield Ice and Coal Company, and the Hammonton and Egg Harbor City Gas Company.

Now, therefore, be it Ordained by the Town of Hammonton, in Council assembled:

Section 1. That the consent of the Town of Hammonton, is hereby given, to the Littlefield Ice and Coal Company, and the Hammonton and Egg Harbor City Gas Company, to lay a terra cotta drain pipe, not less than four inches in diameter, at proper depth and grade, to fully accomplish the purpose for which it is to be constructed, under the surface of the following streets:

BEING, at a point on Passmore avenue, and thence, along the said Lincoln street, to Twelfth street, and thence, along the said Twelfth street, to West End avenue, and thence, along the said West End avenue, to Orchard street, and thence, along the said Orchard street, to the Town ditch on Railroad avenue, paralleling the Pennsylvania Railroad tracks, at which point said drain is to discharge the excess condensation and water, from the plants of the Littlefield Ice and Coal Company, and the Hammonton and Egg Harbor City Gas Company; said consent, however, being given upon the condition hereinafter set forth.

Section 2. That the consent of the Town of Hammonton, as herein now granted, is given with the understanding that the said Littlefield Ice and Coal Company, and the Hammonton and Egg Harbor City Gas Company, shall also secure the consent of the County Board of Freeholders, to lay said drain under the surface of Twelfth street, and across said Railroad avenue, on both said Twelfth street, and said Railroad avenue, are now County roads.

Section 3. That the said drain shall be constructed entirely at the expense of the Littlefield Ice and Coal Company, and the Hammonton and Egg Harbor City Gas Company; and that the said Littlefield Ice and Coal Company, and the Hammonton and Egg Harbor City Gas Company, shall at all times hereafter, maintain and keep in repair said drain, at their own cost and expense, after the same shall have been completed. And also, shall be responsible for all legal costs and expenses of whatever character, connected with the construction and preparation of said drain, and all necessary and incidental expenses thereof, including such advertisement of this Ordinance, or other expenses incident to the laying and construction of said drain.

Section 4. That said work shall be completed within sixty days, and the said Littlefield Ice and Coal Company, and the Hammonton and Egg Harbor City Gas Company, shall replace and repair said streets, as opened by them, at their cost and expense.

Section 5. That the said Littlefield Ice and Coal Company, and the Hammonton and Egg Harbor City Gas Company, shall file within six days, with the Town Clerk, their written acceptance of this Ordinance, upon the terms and conditions so herein set forth; and the consent given shall not become operative until the filing of such written acceptance.

Section 6. That the said Littlefield Ice and Coal Company, and the Hammonton and Egg Harbor City Gas Company, their contractors or agents, in the construction of the said drain, shall be entirely responsible for the safety of the traveling public, while the construction of the said drain is being effected; and that the Town of Hammonton, shall not in any way, become liable for any negligence or any injuries sustained by anyone by and through the construction and operation of said drain. And the said Littlefield Ice and Coal Company, and the Hammonton and Egg Harbor City Gas Company, agree to indemnify and save harmless the Town of Hammonton, from any actions, claims of actions, or damages of any kind whatsoever, for or by reason of the laying of the aforesaid drain.

Section 7. That all of the said work, shall be done, subject to the approval of the Superintendent of Sewerage, who shall be permitted, at all times, to inspect the same, the said Littlefield Ice and Coal Company, and the Hammonton and Egg Harbor City Gas Company, to pay the proper charges and expenses, of the said Superintendent of Sewerage, for his said services in connection with said work.

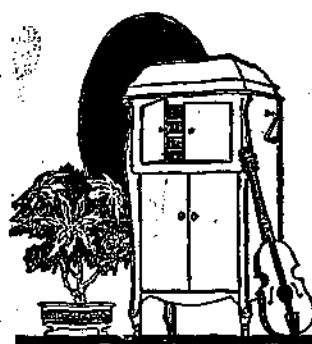
