ENTERING A NEW DIMENSION

Atlantic County Library System/Hammonton became the first ACLS location to offer <u>3D printing</u>. The XYZ da Vinci Duo 2.0 printer was purchased thanks to a grant from Wells Fargo Bank through their Community Connections program. 3D printing uses an additive process to create a three dimensional object



from a digital file. Anyone may submit a request for 3D printing by filling out an online form. The cost varies according to the printed item's weight. (There is a flat fee of \$1 plus a charge of \$.05 per gram of plastic.) Library staff operate the printer and notify the requester when the item is ready for pick up. If the DVD is on the shelf, it can be checked out immediately for two days and a quick turnaround. In addition, DVDs in the library's general collection now may be renewed once, for an additional 7 days, if there are no holds.


Over the past few years, streaming movies on an Internet-connected device has become increasingly popular. Atlantic County Library System card holders have free access to thousands of movies and TV shows from Hollywood studios through the <u>Digital Media</u> heading on the library's website. Videos may be viewed on a PC, mobile device, tablet, or smart TV. No special software is required, but Apple and Android apps provide a mobile-friendly experience.


Library resources are continually evaluated to determine how well they meet library user's needs. As viewing patterns emerge, other resources may be selected to fill the bill. Stay tuned!

Atlantic County Library System 2014 Summer Reading Program

All told, 1,212 participants read 9,558 books, and 4,414 people attended 302 events.

The 2014 summer reading program themes–Fizz, Boom, Read for kids, Spark a Reaction for teens, and Literary Elements for adults–encouraged everyone to explore the world of science through reading and interesting programs featuring presentations by the Marine Mammal Standing Center, South Jersey Ghost Researchers, and Sciencetellers among others. Harry Potter Herbology, How to Survive a Zombie Attack, Grossology 101, Mythbusters experiments, and similar programs sparked imaginations during the busy summer months.



TAYLOR MADE

The Sandy Stories Project premiered to an enthusiastic audience of local residents and area officials at the Brigantine Beach Community Center after months of interviewing, filming, and editing. The project was spearheaded by Atlantic County Library System/Brigantine Branch Manager Beth Bliss and producer Taylor Van Nest, a former library employee. Brigantine residents, first responders, and helpers from on-island and off shared their stories of Hurricane Sandy. The 2 hour, 20 minute documentary was produced with the support of the Atlantic County Library Foundation. Copies of the video are available for checkout at all Atlantic County Library System branches and may be purchased at Atlantic County Library System/Brigantine.

RAISING AWARENESS

The Atlantic County Library System was awarded a <u>2014 LibraryAware</u> <u>Community Award</u> in recognition of the efforts of the Brigantine Branch staff. They were honored for their commitment to serving their community in the aftermath of Hurricane Sandy by connecting residents with vital recovery and rebuilding information and also creating the Sandy Stories Project. LibraryAware Community Awards are given annually by Library Journal and funded by LibraryAware and EBSCO Publishing NoveList Division product.

The Brigantine and Ventnor branches of the library system were honored by the Mental Health Association in Atlantic County for their support of New Jersey Hope and Healing and assisting in its efforts to reach people impacted by Hurricane Sandy. This allowed the organization to dispense information and counsel residents right in their communities. New Jersey Hope and Healing was formed to provide mental health and emotional support for victims of the hurricane.
